The Bob Tyler Fish Hatchery (BTFH) is managed by the Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries, and Parks' Fisheries Bureau.

The Private John Allen Hatchery in Tupelo, MS is managed by the US Fish and Wildlife Service. These two hatcheries partner in raising Alligator gar.


Adult fish are spawned at the Private John
Allen Hatchery. The fry (newly hatched fish)
are then transported to the BTFH and raised
to an "advanced fingerling" size, which is
between 8 and 12 inches long. This provides a
better chance of survival
in the wild.

Stocking is used to maintain or restore declining alligator gar populations.

Did you know?


Young alligator gar grow about an inch a week!

These fish can reach lenghts of 9 feet and weigh over 300 pounds!










Fisheries biologists tag alligator gar before releasing them into the wild. Each tag is numbered. If the fish are re-captured, the tag allows biologists to track development and movement of fish after leaving the hatchery.



Alligator Gar have two rows of large teeth on the upper jaw.

Other gar species have one row.
