Planting Tips:

The pond cypress will take full sun but does better with some shade. Plant in wet to moist soils. Pond cypress are not drought tolerant.

It is best to plant saplings in the fall or early spring when the plant is dormant. They can be planted from seeds.

A hardy plant, pond cypress are not prone to disease.

The Visitor Education Center (VEC) at the Bob Tyler Fish Hatchery is the first and only facility of its kind in Mississippi. It is owned and operated by the Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries, and Parks.

Cypress knees

Description/Season:

This conifer has deeply furrowed bark, which is brown in color.

The pond cypress has awl shaped needles. These needles are bright green but turn to a rich orangebrown color in the fall.

Flowers, which are not conspicuous, are brown as are the seeds. This tree is columnar with upright branchlets on spreading branches.

Habitat:

This cypress is found in various wetland habitats.
