

January 7, 2025 Weekly Waterfowl Report

The following report is a compilation of public and private land reports and habitat assessments during the week ending January 5, 2025.

The new year has begun, and Mississippi waterfowl hunters are anxious to see how the last month of hunting seasons will turn out. Last week was once again dominated by mild temperatures which finally gave way to more seasonal weather by Thursday. A strong front pushed its way across the state over the weekend, beginning with warm, south winds and rain before shifting to below freezing temperatures late Sunday night (a near 40-degree drop in temperature). A winter storm brought some snow and extremely cold temperatures to mid-latitude states and the forecast for this week includes continued freezing temperatures with more northerly winds into the weekend. These factors, combined with the potential for more snow late this week reaching down into perhaps north Mississippi are expected to produce an increase in waterfowl numbers migrating into the state.

Waterfowl harvest reports increased last week from the previous one on many Wildlife Management Areas (WMAs). Gadwall, green-winged teal, and ring-necked ducks made up a large proportion of hunter harvest reports from public and private lands, but mallard harvest also apparently increased. Availability of quality wetland habitat and weather conditions will continue to influence waterfowl harvest as winter continues along. Biologist are optimistic that a weather-induced southern migration of waterfowl, particularly mallards, could materialize this week. Overnight lows will likely produce icy conditions on shallow wetlands throughout the week, creating challenging hunting conditions. Hunters are encouraged to scout various areas and wetland types as birds may shift to using deep or flowing water until food-rich, shallow wetlands are available again after thawing.

The early January aerial waterfowl survey is currently underway after experiencing weather delays. Mississippi typically observes peak waterfowl numbers during January, and biologists are expecting this year to be no different. As soon as the survey report is completed, it will be posted on mdwfp.com and on MDWFP social media accounts.
