

January 28, 2025 Weekly Waterfowl Report

The following report is a compilation of public and private land reports and habitat assessments during the week ending January 26, 2025.

After a brief warm-up, winter returned to Mississippi last week with several overnight lows (and even some highs) dipping well below the freezing mark. This event was colder and longer in duration than the previous cold snap, causing widespread coverage of ice on shallow wetlands as well as many small and medium sized ponds, brakes, and sloughs. As a result, waterfowl became highly concentrated on a relatively small number of wetlands with open water across the Mississippi Delta. Ducks were observed using rivers, deep lakes, and reservoirs as they waited for better foraging areas to thaw and become available again.

Waterfowl harvest on many public and private lands increased early last week because of favorable weather conditions for continued southern migration, although ice quickly became a challenge for birds and hunters to access open water. Temperatures began to warm over the weekend, and harvest reports have again increased as these areas have thawed. Mississippi's regular waterfowl hunting season will continue through Friday, January 31. There will also be a Youth, Veterans, and Active Military waterfowl hunting weekend February 8 - 9. Additionally, the light goose conservation order will resume February 1 - 7 and February 10 - March 31.

The late January aerial waterfowl survey is completed and a report will be posted soon on mdwfp.com and on MDWFP social media accounts.
