General Information: As part of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, Aberdeen Lake covers 4,121 acres in central Monroe county. Impounded in 1984, it is owned and managed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. The reservoir extends 22 miles from Amory Lock and Dam (mile 371.1) down to Aberdeen Lock and Dam (mile 357.5). Historically, Aberdeen Lake has been a destination for bass and crappie anglers from around the state and has hosted multiple state level bass tournaments in recent years.

Location: Just northeast of Aberdeen, MS along Lock and Dam Rd.

Fishery Management: Largemouth Bass, crappie, and catfish.





Below: Angler catch rates for all species have declined since 2017. 84,000 Largemouth Bass were stocked in 2022, but it will take a few years to notice any positive impact.

Left: Creel questions from 2022 on Aberdeen Lake. There were not a lot of repeat anglers during creeling, as 89% were new interviews. Fewer than 20% of those asked read the fishing reports posted weekly on MDWFP.com. Most anglers believe the fishing is about the same on the Tenn-Tom, while those with other opinions were evenly split. No anglers interviewed had seen invasive Silver Carp jumping, while one angler (4% of the survey) was unsure.

Below: Between 2017 and 2022, the most popular fish targeted switched from bass to crappie. Catfish angling more than tripled in that same time period.







Over the last several years, a new invasive aquatic plant was found in various water bodies along the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway. Giant Salvinia is a floating plant iust like its cousin Common Salvinia. But unlike its cousin, Giant Salvinia has a propensity to spread and grow at a much faster rate and has the potential to choke off backwater areas. It is critical that anglers visiting the lake clean their boats and boat trailers to reduce the possibility of transferring this plant to other water bodies. Giant Salvinia is extremely difficult to control once it becomes established.
